The Palouse Choral Society's 26th season is off to a great start! After a busy summer including the life-changing opportunity for many of our singers to travel to New York to perform at Carnegie Hall, we've now welcomed 33 new members to our choir. It's been very enjoyable to bring these new singers into the fold and make some amazing music together. We kicked off the season with our potluck, then had a member retreat in September, and we've now successfully had our first performance at Sing for Unity, a community singing event featuring 10 Palouse area choirs.



We cannot wait to share our first full concert, <u>To Be Sung on the Water</u>, October 17 and 18.

music history. We have
music dating back to
the Renaissance,

including a motet by Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina and a madrigal by Maddalena Casulana, the first female composer ever to have a book of her works published.

We'll sing a spiritual, a Bollywood arrangement, some folk tunes, and even a familiar Simon & Garfunkel tune.

We'll also premiere a brand-new piece, "Sing On," by MaryAnne Muglia, an Arizona-based composer, arranger, teacher, and jazz/a cappella performer. Muglia is the winner of PCS's 4th annual Composition Contest, which included submissions from composers across the world.

We hope to see you at our fall concerts – and the rest of our events throughout the season!

Choral music is alive and well here in the Palouse region, and we are excited share it with you.

SING FOR UNITY: LOCAL AND GLOBAL



Sing for Unity was conceived by Vive Bregendahl in Denmark.

She wanted to create an event where singers around the world could come together in peace, unity, community and equality. Each participating group was encouraged to sing for an hour at 2pm local time, ending with "What a Wonderful World", sending a sound wave around the world.

The event took place on Sunday, September 21, the UN International Day of Peace.

With over 10,000 voices in 176 cities participating, we are very proud that Palouse Choral Society took the lead to bring this event to the Palouse.

Ten local ensembles, including High School, University, Church and Community choirs, along with members of the community, made wonderful music together, contributing to the global sound wave.

It is also a reminder to my students that singing is a life-long activity and that the choral art is not just reserved for the concert hall, but is often most appreciated in the informal and casual spaces where there is no "audience". We all take part in creating the experience.


CARNEGIE: A NATIONAL STAGE


Not sure how long it'll take me to fully process this concert.
