Dr. Kevin T. Padworski, the artistic director of the Colorado Chorale, earned his DMA in choral conducting from the University of Colorado. Active also as a composer, he has works published through Santa Barbara, Hal Leonard, Pavane, and MusicSpoke. His work *Vox Crepusculum* was commissioned by the Palouse Choral Society for its twentieth anniversary concert, intended to be held in 2020 but finally occurring this afternoon. Before selecting the poetry for the piece, he communicated with members of the Chorale to hear their feelings about what singing and making music mean to them. Their responses led him to select poems by James Thomson and Siegfried Sassoon. These texts are interwoven in the piece; the first, second, third, and fourth stanzas come from Thomson's "For I Must Sing of All I Feel and Know," while the fifth comprises Sassoon's poem "Before the Battle." The sixth and eighth stanzas feature texts inspired by responses from the Choral Society, and the seventh, ninth, and tenth stanzas return to Thomson's poem. We hope you enjoy the first ever performance of this new choral-orchestral work!

#### Prayer for Ukraine

Ukrainian composer Mykola Lysenko composed a variety of operas, choral works, orchestral works, and songs during the late Romantic period. His work was pivotal in maintaining nationalism in Ukrainian music. His hymn "Prayer for Ukraine," set to a poem by Oleksandr Konysky, is often considered the nation's "spiritual anthem." This performance is dedicated to all Ukrainians throughout the world as they observe the dangerous conflict obliterating their home at this time. We are especially grateful to our pianist, Elena Panchenko, for her consistent guidance and artistry even during this time of turmoil.

Ay me! I sit and cry me,

Thomas Morley was an English composer, editor, theorist, and organist in the Renaissance Era. He is best known for adapting existing Italian madrigals into his own English arrangements. The new piece, called a "contrafactum," often became more famous than its predecessor. *Fyer, Fyer* is a contrafactum of *A la strada, o Dio,* by the celebrated late Italian madrigalist Luca Marenzio. Marenzio's three-part madrigal from 1585 became a five-part piece after Morley revisited the work ten years later. *Fyer, Fyer* explores the frantic emotions of falling in love. The five choral parts imitate one another in a hectic manner to display the deep and uncontrollable force of love.

Married couple Jocelyn Hagen and Timothy Takach have been active composers in the Twin Cities area since their wedding in 2006, the same year that they founded Graphite Publishing, a pioneering organization in the distribution of choral music via digital download rather than paper scores. In 2017, the couple relocated to Hagen's parents' lake cabin while their new home was being built in the suburbs of Minneapolis. While they holed up near the lake, they worked together to complete a collaborative commission for the Seattle-based choir The Esosterics. They sat at the piano side by side and took the time to hone every detail of the larger work collaboratively. *This is How You Love*, the thirteen-movement piece, includes a variety of poems about love as well as transcripts from couples' therapy sessions. The third and third-to-last movements (excerpted in this performance) are both set for double choir. Each choir sings a different poem about love in a different key. The two choirs subsequently perform the texts simultaneously. The resulting bitonality provides both the tension and warmth of dissonant chords. The extended work displays both composers' lyricism and penchant for rhythmic and harmonic complexity.

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, one of the most prolific and original melodists of the Austrian Classical Era, composed seventeen extant settings of the Mass Ordinary. The Ordinary texts include the Kyrie, Gloria, Credo, Sanctus, and Agnus Deifive moments in each Mass service in which the texts remain the same every Sunday. (During the Classical Era, the Sanctus was often divided into two movements, with a separate Benedictus section taking on its own unique musical character.) Mozart's Masses are divided into two categories: *missa brevis*, or short Mass, and *missa solemnis*, or solemn (longer) Mass. Mozart composed most of his *missa brevis* settings in the early part of his career, when Emperor Joseph II preferred for church services to have less music. Later in his career, Mozart was free to expound on the musical material in his Mass settings, resulting in lengthier solemn Mass settings. The *Krönungsmesse* is the shortest of the long Masses -- or the longest of the short Masses -- so in a sense it defies such classification. He wrote the Mass in 1779, and it soon became the preferred Mass by Austrian monarchs during regal events. By the early 1800s, it had earned its nickname *Krönungsmesse* (or *Coronation Mass*). Throughout the piece, Mozart infuses the serious and ornamented Baroque style with the stable chord progressions of the Classical Era. This afternoon's performance will include the Austro-Germanic pronunciation of the Greek and Latin texts for a historically informed performance.

#### <u> Alisa Toy - Soprano</u>



Originally from Alberta, Canada, Alisa holds a MM in Voice and Choral Conducting from the University of Idaho and a Bachelor's degree in Music Education from Mississippi University for Women. Favorite singing opportunities include the role of Pamina in Mozart's *The Magic Flute*, Gertrude in *Hänsel and Gretel*, and soloing with the Palouse Choral Society, Mississippi State Symphony Choir and Orchestra, and the Greeley Chorale and Philharmonic Orchestra. She has soloed in Great Britain and Italy including a concert for Pope Benedict XVI. She recently won the University of Idaho Concerto/Aria Competition and placed first in the Southern Region NATS vocal competition in 2011. Alisa enjoyed serving several years in public and private schools teaching K-12 music and is in her 28th year of teaching voice and piano through her private studio.

#### Codi Linafelter - Mezzo Soprano



Codi Linafelter grew up following her father around in the United States Air Force. Born in Maryland, Codi quickly moved across several states and, after a stint in Europe, her family retired to Burley, Idaho. Codi is currently studying Vocal Performance with Dr. Christopher Pfund at the University of Idaho—a 180° turn from where she thought her life was headed. Codi planned on becoming an Air Force pilot for nearly a decade. After a profound call to music and performance, she found herself at the foot of the Lionel Hampton School of Music—and the rest is history. Codi is finishing her second semester of studying voice at the University of Idaho, where she has been heard singing with the University of Idaho's Jazz Band II as a featured jazz vocalist as well as in the roles of Orpheus in the *Orfeo* Opera Workshop scenes of 2021, the Second Lady in *Die Zauberflöte*, and Hansel in *Hansel and Gretel*. She earned 1st place as an Alto at the 2021 IMEA State Solo and Ensemble

Competition, as well as 1st place as a First-Year Female vocalist at the 2021 NATS Competition. This is Codi's second performance with the Palouse Choral Society as their featured Mezzo soloist, after her debut performance in Handel's *Messiah* in December of 2021. In addition to singing alongside orchestras and bands, Codi writes and produces her own music. Most of all, Codi is thrilled beyond measure to be sharing music with the world around her and is excited to be performing with the Inland Northwest Opera this summer in *Carmen and the Bull* as the title role. #### Nicholas Klein - Tenor



A teacher, singer, conductor, and pianist/accompanist/coach based out of Seattle, WA, Nicholas Klein, tenor, is often known for his warmth and clarity of tone in addition to his exceptional musicianship. Dr. Klein is a member of the music faculty at Eastern Washington University as a Lecturer in Vocal Music and Seattle Pacific University as an Instructor of Voice and the director of the new Vocal Jazz Ensemble this year. In addition to his positions at EWU and SPU, Nicholas currently serves as the Music Director for Central Lutheran Church in the Capitol Hill neighborhood of Seattle. Prior to beginning his studies at University of Washington, Nicholas lived in Columbus, OH, where he was a tenured soloist and section leader of the Cathedral Schola at St. Joseph Cathedral, where he also served for 6 months as the Interim Director of Music for the Catholic Diocese of Columbus. Nicholas has been recognized internationally as a soloist and chorus member for his performances in

Hungary, Switzerland and Italy (Tuscany region and Rome). Recent engagements/roles include BWV 97 (Soloist) with the Seattle Bach Choir, Larry/Matt (*The Face on the Barroom Floor*), Don José (*Carmen* - excerpts), and Flavio (*Norma*). Future engagements include performing as the tenor soloist in the Mozart *Requiem* with the Spokane Symphony, and Dr. Caius in *Falstaff* with Puget Sound Concert Opera. Nicholas is also a member of Choral Audacity, a professional choir based in the San Francisco bay area.

#### Aaron Agulay - Baritone



Aaron Agulay, baritone, is incredibly grateful to be performing and sharing live music once again with the Palouse Choral Society. Agulay has extensive performing experience in venues and organizations worldwide ranging from summer-stock theaters to nationally and internationally renowned opera houses --Opernhaus Zürich, Konzert Theater Bern, Theater Magdeburg, Central City Opera, Opera Theatre of St. Louis, and Carnegie Hall. As a performer, adjudicator and clinician, Agulay continues to garner recognition throughout the Pacific Northwest region with ongoing performances, masterclasses, collaborations, festivals and competitions. This season Agulay will be making his debut at the Martin Woldson Theater at the Fox as the baritone soloist in Carl Orff's *Carmina Burana* with the Spokane Symphony under the baton of music director, James Lowe. He will also be making his debut with Wenatchee Valley Symphony Orchestra for their 75th Diamond

Anniversary Season as a soloist for Handel's *Messiah* under the baton of music director, Nikolas Caoile. At Washington State University, he is part of the voice faculty and on January 28th, he joined his colleague Dr. Yoon-Wha Roh to perform Schubert's *Winterreise*, as part of the Elson S. Floyd Cultural Series Inaugural Season and SOM's Faculty Artist Series.

#### Artistic Director



Recently hired as Palouse Choral Society's Artistic Director, Dr. Matthew Myers is new to the Palouse region. He works as associate director of choral music education at Washington State University, where he conducts the University Singers and Treble Choir and teaches courses in music education, conducting, and rock history. He earned his DMA in choral conducting from Louisiana State University, his master's degree in choral conducting from Northern Arizona University, and his bachelor's degree in vocal performance and music education from Luther College. After completing his degree at Luther, he taught grades 6-12 choir at The American International School of Muscat in Oman. For the following five years, he worked as director of choirs and musical theatre at Boylan Catholic High School in Rockford, Illinois. In addition to conducting five choirs, he taught AP music theory, class piano, and critical thinking and coordinated a middle school choral program at four of Boylan's constituent grade schools. He has served as conductor of the NAU Men's Chorale and Chamber Singers, the LSU Chamber Singers, the Master Chorale of Flagstaff, and the Flagstaff Youth Chorale and has held church music positions in Iowa, Illinois, Louisiana, and Alabama. Prior to his time at

WSU, Dr. Myers taught at the University of Alabama, where he conducted two choirs and taught courses in music appreciation, choral literature, vocal pedagogy, and diction. He is the co-host of the Choir Fam Podcast.

#### Chorale Accompanist



Elena Panchenko is originally from Ukraine and studied at the Moscow Conservatory, where she earned her degree in piano performance, music history, and music theory. She served as the musical director of the Penn State Opera for four years and performed the debut of two new operas, including Mrs. Satan, an opera about the life of the first woman presidential candidate, Victoria Woodhall. Working extensively as an accompanist and church musician, Elena has performed with groups as varied as a children's dance group to such well-known musicians as Francis Orval and David Shifrin, clarinetist and Director of Chamber Music at the Lincoln Center. In addition to Elena's duties with Palouse Choral Society, she is also the music director at St. James Episcopal Church in Pullman. Elena's family includes her husband, Alex, WSU math professor and former

Ukrainian rock star (as is Elena), and their son Ivan, an attorney.

#### Children's Choir Conductor



Stephanie Sant received her Bachelor of Music in K-12 Vocal Music Education and her Master of Education in Curriculum and Instruction from the University of Idaho. She studied voice with noted vocalist and professor Dorothy Barnes. Ms. Sant has taught K-6 General Music at A.B. McDonald Elementary School in Moscow and currently conducts the Moscow High School Choir and extra-curricular jazz choir Encore. She also teaches movement and dance at McDonald Elementary, her 24th year in Moscow School District. She has conducted the children's choir for 5 years. Stephanie is active in the national music fraternity Sigma Alpha lota, which promotes and supports music education and fine arts in schools and communities. She participates in American Choral Directors Association and the National Association for Music Education. Ms. Sant enjoys singing in the Chamber Choir and Chorale and in the community as a soloist

## Thoughts on singing, choral music, and singing with Palouse Choral Society brought to you by our members:

...singing makes me happy

Singing brings joy to me. Part is physical - breathing, rattling the sinuses, heart beating faster; I always get warm. Part is emotional - the beauty of the music, the meaning of the words, the appreciation when the conductor teaches us aspects of the music (for me, especially historical info about the composers). Part is social/emotional - it is moving to be standing as an individual among others, all breathing together, harmonizing, matching our rhythms....

#### It feeds my soul.

I love being a small part of an exquisite sound, hearing my own part blend in with those of others. For me, it is a metaphor for community, how we come together to create something far richer than we can create on our own.

#### Singing makes me whole. It gives me joy.

I sing for fun.

I sing because I have always sung, and always will. Singing is like a reflex, or another way of speaking.

I sing without realizing I'm doing it.

Singing makes me whole. It gives me joy.

Singing helps to give my life meaning. It's a form of worship. It has a big impact on my life. It comforts and cheers me, lets me soar above the mundane and the hurts of life. It carries my joys.

...one Christmas over a decade ago I heard the Palouse Choral Society sing in St. Boniface. It was such a moving concert I knew I wanted to be a part of that sound. Choral singing is such a collaborative piece of art. Years later I still love singing surrounded by other voices that immerse me in a powerful musical experience shared with our community.

## Choral music is the spirit in each of us (breath) made audible.


Choral music bonds us together across every culture and walk of life; to add one's voice to a choir is to understand one other's humanity.
