## Program Notes & Translations

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Thomas Morley was an English Renaissance composer, singer, and church musician. He is one of the most prominent composers of the English Madrigal, and is best known for his secular music. Morley served as the organist for St. Paul's Cathedral in London, and was a contemporary of Shakespeare.

Born near Worcester, England, Edward Elgar was born to parents who were musicians. His father owned a music shop and was a piano tuner, thus he grew up teaching himself to play various instruments. He is largely self-taught as a composer, and struggled as a composer for quite some time because of his lack of formal training. The fact that he was Roman Catholic- a minority religion in an Anglican majority country- also made him the recipient of religious prejudice and bigotry. Perhaps best known for his instrumental works, particularly one of his famous *Pomp and Circumstance Marches*, which is often heard at commencement ceremonies around the world, Elgar also wrote several cantatas, oratorios, and part songs. *The Shower* is one of his part songs, written in 1914.

"La Lluvia" is translated as "The Rain." The melody in the piece was inspired by folk melody from Ecuador, which would usually be played on the siku. The siku is a traditional panpipe instrument, native to the Andean Mountains in South America. The piece follows the pattern of a tropical rainfall, beginning lightly, then alternating between a downpour and lighter rain to the end where the rain gradually diminishes.

The South African group, Ladysmith Black Mambazo, founded in the early 1960s by Joseph Shabalala released "Rain, Rain, Beautiful Rain," in 1987, when it quickly became a hit. The group became known internationally through their work with Paul Simon. They are still recording, and their album, *Walking in the Footsteps of Our Fathers*, received a Grammy award nomination for Best World Music Album in 2016. This is the group's 17<sup>th</sup> Grammy Award nomination.

A Northwest native, Morten Lauridsen, attended college at Whitman University in Walla Walla before going to the University of Southern California to study composition, where he has been on the faculty since 1967. Lauridsen's refuge for composing is on Waldron Island in the San Juan Archipelago, where he has composed many of his works.

*Les Chansons des Roses* is a set of five pieces that feature selected French poetry of German poet, Rainer Maria Rilke (1875-1926). Rilke wrote a large number of French poems about the rose elucidating its timelessness through all of its transformations, even its contradictory nature. These poems also illustrate his use of the rose as motif and metaphor. These poems all reflect solitude in some way, which Rilke wrote about quite a lot. In doing so, he illuminated our need for very little solitude- in other words, our need for companionship. In his metaphor of the rose, Rilke sheds light on effects of solitude on the lover, the loved, and on human need, in general.

## Program Notes

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"The *Liebeslieder Polkas* is the first opus of P.D.Q. Bach's to be discovered in which he inflicted his music on the work of well-known poets, or even known poets, for that matter. The fact that all the poets represented are English leads one to surmise that P.D.Q.'s drinking companion Jonathan "Boozey" Hawkes had something to do with instigating the piece; Hawkes eventually married P.D.Q.'s cousin Betty-Sue Bach and returned to his native Liverpool, where the two of them spent their senility publishing most of the unmourned composer's vocal music. As far as observing the integrity of these already-famous poems is concerned, P.D.Q.'s attitude ranges from indifference to contempt. Some of the poems are set complete, others are rather haphazardly cut, some contain completely spurious interpolations, and in one case—Ben Jonson's beloved *Song to Celia*—the poem has been extensively rewritten to reflect the composer's besotted *Weltanschauung*. A word about the fifth hand in the piano part: When Brahms wrote his *Liebeslieder Waltzes* (in obvious imitation of P.D.Q. Bach, but as usual, without giving the earlier composer any credit) he scored the accompaniment for piano and four hands; by adding a third person at the piano P.D.Q. not only expanded the range of the accompaniment, but he also made sure that there was always one hand free for turning pages. Or, to look at it another way, he made life much more interesting for the page-turner." —Professor Peter Schickele

## Artistic and Music Director

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Dr. Sarah J. Graham is Assistant Professor of Music in the Humanities Division at Lewis-Clark State College. At LCSC, Dr. Graham conducts the Concert Choir and teaches Survey of Music, Introduction to the Arts, History of Musical Theater, American Music, Early Childhood Music, Conducting, and Private Applied Voice. Prior to her appointment at LCSC, she served as the Director of Choral Music at Kaskaskia College, Assistant Director of Choral Activities at Illinois State University and the Director of Choral Activities at Monmouth College, all in Illinois. Dr. Graham attended Michigan State University in East Lansing where she received her DMA and MM degrees in music conducting while studying with Charles Smith, David Rayl, Jonathan I. Reed and Sandra Snow. Prior to attending Michigan State University, Dr. Graham taught public school choral music in Washington State where she received a BA in Secondary Choral Music Education and Church Music from Whitworth in Spokane, and an MA degree in Classroom Teaching and English from Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma. An active member of her professional organizations, Dr. Graham has served on the state boards for both the Illinois and Washington chapters of the American Choral Directors Associations (ACDA) and currently serves as the Idaho ACDA membership chair and the Northwest division's College and University Repertoire and Resources chair. Additionally, she served as the secretary for National Collegiate Choral Organization (NCCO). Dr. Graham is active as a guest conductor, clinician and adjudicator for solo and ensemble, as well as large group choral contests and festivals. Dr. Graham conducted the 2014 Washington All-State Symphonic Choir, and conducted the MENC All-Northwest Treble Choir in 2009. Remaining active in her professional organizations, she regularly presents sessions at meetings and conferences both regionally and nationally, including the ACDA and the National Association for Music Education (NAfME- formerly the Music Educator's National Conference). Dr. Graham serves as the choral director at Nativity Episcopal Church in Lewiston, Idaho. She resides in Lewiston with her two children (adopted from Ghana, West Africa) and her three dogs.

## Chorale Accompanist

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Elena Panchenko is originally from Ukraine and studied at the Moscow Conservatory where she earned her degree in piano performance, music history and music theory. She served as the Musical Director of the Penn State Opera for four years and performed the debut of two new operas, including *Mrs. Satan*, an opera about the life of the first woman presidential candidate, Victoria Woodhull. Working extensively as an accompanist and church musician, Elena has performed with groups as varied as a children's dance group to such well-known musicians as Francis Orval and David Shifrin, clarinetist and Music Director of Chamber Music at the Lincoln Center. In addition to Elena's duties with the chorale, she is also the Music Director at St. James' Episcopal Church in Pullman. Elena's family includes her husband, Alex, WSU Math Professor and former Ukrainian rock star (as is Elena), and their son Ivan, an attorney.



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
